Dear SACIV Members & Friends,

Thank you for your support of SACIV and your role in acting as citizen diplomats and global ambassadors throughout San Antonio this past year!

It's certainly been an exciting year of impact and cross-cultural engagement, as we have increased the volume of US Department of State funded programs welcomed to San Antonio by a large margin from 2017. This past year, we hosted 40 programs, welcoming 319 visitors from as many as 91 countries to our city. Our programs focused on themes such as non-profit management, civic activism, media, refugee & immigration issues, economic development, education, and even sports diplomacy. In addition to hosting "International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP)" delegations, we expanded our portfolio by continuing to partner with Global Ties US to host training academies for three groups of Mexican police officers as part of the "Police Professionalization Exchange Program", as well as collaborating on new initiatives such as the "Open World", which brought educators from Ukraine to our city for a week, and the "Youth Basketball Conflict Resolution & Tolerance Camp", which brought 30 young athletes from five Eastern European countries to San Antonio for two weeks.

You - our members & the community - have been vital in guaranteeing that San Antonio has provided a warm and welcoming atmosphere for our visitors. You have volunteered over 400 hours of your time to ensure that our signature events, such as our "Annual Dinner", as well as our new "Membership Luncheon", were a tremendous success. Furthermore, our home hospitality hosts have provided of 120 meals to our visitors, opening their homes to strangers and taken the time to ensure that these guests all left as friends. They have navigated the often-confusing waters of cross-cultural communication and in doing so, graciously welcomed SACIV visitors to San Antonio. I know first-hand that the generosity they have shown has greatly touched our guests and will be a memory they carry with them for a lifetime. And in doing so, they have all acted as the citizen diplomats that are the backbone of our organization!

It's been an exciting year of building connections to the people, ideas, and issues shaping our global future. And your support has made a world of difference – thank you! I look forward to our work together in the future in furthering our goals to connect San Antonio to the world and create a more global community.



The International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP) is an official U.S. government exchange program administered by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. The objective of the program is to advance U.S. foreign policy goals by increasing mutual understanding between the people of the United States and those of other countries. The IVLP is the U.S. Department of State's premier professional exchange program.

Through short-term visits to the United States, current and emerging foreign leaders in a variety of fields experience this country firsthand and cultivate lasting relationships with their American counterparts. Professional meetings reflect the participants' professional interests and support the foreign policy goals of the United States. Current and emerging leaders from across the world come to the United States on the International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP) to meet with professional counterparts and visit U.S. public and private sector organizations related to their field of interest.

International Visitors also share their culture and offer insight on best practices and perspectives with their hosts in the United States. International Visitors are accompanied by either foreign language interpreters or English language officers, contractors though the State Department's Office of Language Services, who also facilitate travel and help explain American society, history, and culture.

The International Visitor Program brings almost 5,000 foreign visitors to the U.S. each year to meet and confer with their professional counterparts and to experience the United States firsthand. The visitors, who are current or potential leaders in government, politics, the media, education, and other fields, are carefully selected by American embassy officials overseas. Over 335 current and former heads of state, thousands of cabinet-level ministers, and many other distinguished world leaders in government and the private sector have participated in the International Visitor Leadership Program over the past 75 years.


